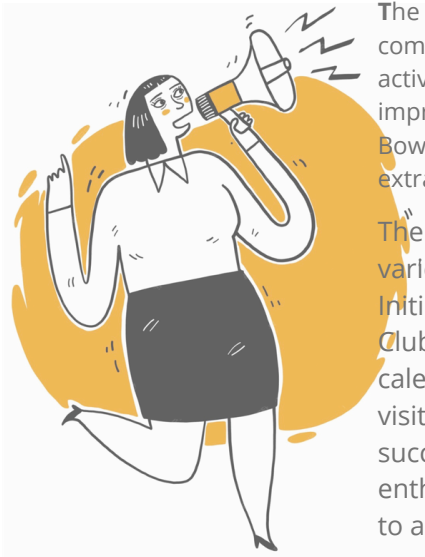

The 2020–2025 Community Action Plan emphasised the need for more varied activities, a goal that has certainly been achieved this year. Initiatives by groups such as the Darvel Dinner Ladies, DIG, the Masonic Club, and the Darvel Horticultural Society have enriched the local social calendar. Monthly markets have continued to draw residents and visitors alike, while the Darvélo event was once again a standout success. Walkfest, too, benefited from excellent weather and enthusiastic participation, further demonstrating Darvel's commitment to a thriving community life.

Looking Forward to 2026

Attention is now turning to the opportunities and milestones that 2026 will bring. The upcoming 2026–2031 Community Action Plan, with publication before the end of 2025 followed by a formal launch early in the new year, will help shape future development and improvements for our town.

A major highlight of 2026 will be the 150th anniversary of the introduction of mechanised looms to Darvel by Alexander Morton. This was an era that transformed the Irvine Valley into a world leader in lace production. Next year is a timely opportunity to celebrate and honour our rich industrial heritage.

Celebrating Community Achievements

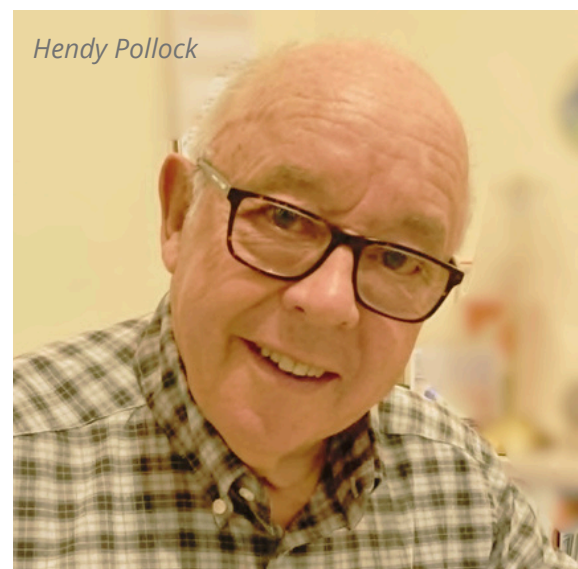

THE BIG DIG CLEAN UPS

In April, approximately 30 participants, including members of the local Guide/Brownie group, took part in a town and local park clean-up. Over 20 bags of rubbish were collected. Following the event, attendees gathered at the local church hall for refreshments. As a result, the town is looking much tidier.

EASTER EGG HUNT

On Easter Sunday, the annual Easter egg hunt was held in Lanfine Estate with permission from the Sasse family. Nearly 200 children participated in games along the avenue, concluding at the courtyard where each child received an Easter Egg and snacks. A Tombola stall was also featured. Donations collected will support next year's event.

DARVEL IN BLOOM

Hanging baskets on the Town Hall and Hastings Square were organised by DIG and are being maintained over the summer by volunteers using a new watering system. Funding for the baskets was provided by Darvel Lottery. Volunteers planted around 1,000 bedding plants across various locations in Darvel, including Burn Green tubs, planters on Main Street, East and West end gardens, Millennium and Rose garden, plus Hastings Square. This work was completed just in time for our annual Café Day.





HASTINGS SQUARE CAFÉ DAY

Due to inclement weather, the annual Café Day, typically held outdoors in Hastings Square, was relocated indoors to the Town Hall. At least everybody was dry! Entertainment was provided by local groups Loudoun Friends and Crossroads Community Hub Choir.

PLANTERS

Following a request for volunteers to "adopt a planter," community members, including pupils (like Jasper) from Darvel primary school, have been assigned planters to maintain during the summer.



QUIZ NIGHTS

Quiz nights are scheduled to take place in the coming months.

CHRISTMAS FAYRE

The Christmas Fayre is planned for November 15th in Darvel Town Hall with more than 30 stalls offering a variety of goods. Come along and enjoy food and entertainment while browsing your pre-Christmas shopping experience.

ALEXANDER FLEMING MEMORIAL

The project to develop a memorial for Alexander Fleming is progressing, with land acquisition expected soon. Upon completion of the purchase, renovation work will commence under the direction of appointed architects. One of the more striking and poignant aspects of the renovation will be the repositioning of Fleming's bronze bust to face towards his birthplace at Lochfield Farm above Darvel.

With **2028** marking the centenary of Penicillin's discovery by Alexander Fleming, DIG plans to begin commemorations with the renovation and unveiling of the memorial in Hastings Square. The new Fleming mural at the "The Corner" has been widely praised and it is anticipated that the new Memorial will contribute positively to Darvel's profile as a destination for visitors.

DARVEL IMPROVEMENT GROUP

Where did it start?



In the year 2000 a group of very active and forward thinking Community Councillors decided to play on the success of Darvel's Millennium Celebrations. 1st January 2000 saw groups of people gather in Hastings Square to welcome in the New Year. As this event was so successful the Community Council decided to form a group whose purpose was to make the town a more attractive place to live. To that end three sub-groups were formed under the Chairmanship of Reid Ross.

Heritage, Environmental and Millennium groups led by Frank Donnelly, Les Pittams and Mike Duffy were created with assistance by Neil McKenna who was employed by EAC as a funding officer. Darvel Improvement Group was formed and fully constituted in 2001.

Since 2001 the town has seen major improvements, not least with the provision of floral displays along Main Street and Hastings Square. These are all planted and maintained by DIG volunteers. Welcome gardens at the West and East ends of Darvel provide much needed colour and are a prime example of a town proud of its appearance.

DIG managed to acquire funding to have new railings, to replace broken fencing, installed at the "Dervall Dam" corner with plaques attached telling the story of the area and how the water source was used to drive the first Lace power loom in the town.

Lace production, of course, was the main source of employment for over 125 years. An exhibition of lace production was organised by DIG in the last remaining lace producing factory, Smith & Archibald where a lace panel depicting the battle of Britain was on display along with a number of lace queen dresses. The last working loom was in operation that day and former lace workers were on hand to describe their work in the factories.

The Toll Gate garden in Ranoldcupp Road houses the original town Toll Gates. An official opening ceremony by Provost James Boyd was held by DIG in 2001 with further celebrations held in the Town Hall. The garden continues to be maintained by DIG volunteers.

In 2001 the Heritage Committee unveiled a memorial cairn, in association with the Blair Mayne Association of Northern Ireland, to commemorate the Special Air Service soldiers who were based in Darvel in 1944. These troops, under the command of Lt. Col. Blair "Paddy" Mayne, were housed in Lanfine House and the Town Hall during that time.

The renovation of the Rose garden in Morton Park was an idea discussed in the first community action plan for Darvel. The planning and sourcing of funding was undertaken by Maureen Ross, another DIG volunteer, with work completed in 2017. Volunteers continue to maintain this beautiful addition to Morton Park.

Daffodil bulbs have been planted in Morton Park providing much needed colour in the Spring. Now annual activities include the ever popular Easter Egg hunt in Lanfine Estate, Litter Picks, Quiz nights, Outdoor Café days and of course, our Christmas Fayre.

Another exciting project undertaken by DIG volunteers is the replacement of the now, almost derelict, Sir Alexander Fleming Memorial in Hastings Square. As 2028 marks the 100th anniversary of the discovery of Penicillin by Darvel's most famous son, a more fitting memorial will be in position.

Frank Donnelly's much anticipated museum, showcasing the history of Darvel, was opened in 2015 in Darvel Town Hall. The museum houses photos and memorabilia of the lace industry across the years. The life of Darvel's most famous son, Sir Alexander Fleming, is also featured in the museum. He came from humble beginnings in Lochfield Farm to being the world famous micro-biologist whose discovery has saved millions of lives worldwide.

As 2026 marks the 25th anniversary of this amazing group, a number of celebratory activities have been planned.



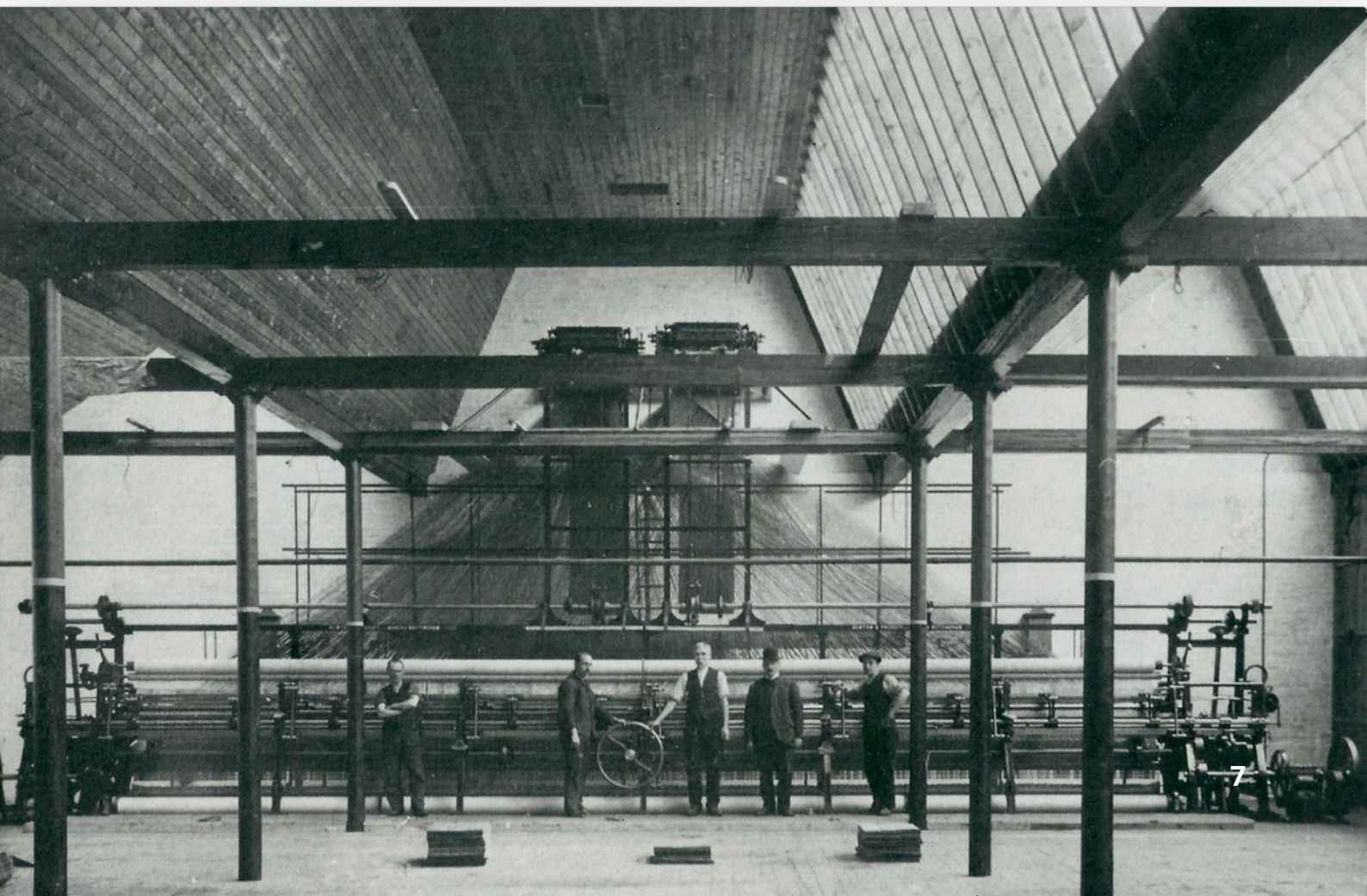
VALLEY LACE

There is an amazing story to be told of the Irvine Valley's international status as a major producer of lace furnishings and other textiles... for generations.

Next year will mark 150 years producing machine made lace in the Valley. The very first "power loom" was introduced by Alexander Morton to Darvel in 1875 with production of lace commencing in February 1876.

We have big plans to celebrate this in a series of activities and events throughout 2026.

Darvel's Rogue Heroes

This is the third in our series of articles charting the history of the 1st SAS and their connection with Darvel.



As Darvel was the centre of the SAS training in Ayrshire, it was not so unusual for some of the men to have met their future wives whilst training.
Two examples are on the following pages...





L/Cpl **Douglas (Dougie) "Monty" Monteith** (1917- 2003)

Born in Wigtownshire in 1917, his father was noted as being a 'grieve' (gamekeeper) At the outbreak of war, Douglas joined 8th Devonshire Territorial Unit. He was later selected for No.8 Commando Unit, having served under the commands of David Stirling and Paddy Mayne in previous units. It had now become the SAS and after intensive training in Arran, he was sent to Egypt and Cape of Good Hope with the Special Raiding Squadron.

Their billet at the Suez, was Ulster Monarch, a ferry which previously sailed from Belfast to Liverpool before on war duty. Gen. Montgomery arrived at the Ulster Monarch to pay the Special Raiding Squadron a visit and give them a pep talk. When he reached the end of his speech, he wished them the best of luck before taking his leave. The call for 'three cheers for Monty', fell on deaf ears but Douglas, seized the opportunity and immediately jumped up onto one of the ship's capstans, taking a very theatrical bow. When asked why, he said "he was called Monty as well you know". Gen. Montgomerie had made it clear he was opposed to the guerilla antics of the SAS so left without making an impression, but it was Douglas's antics that had captured the cheering from his comrades.

Having been trained to be self sufficient in the field and having been brought up in farming life, it fell to Douglas to prepare the day's catch for their meal. As he was skinning and gutting a sheep, but was aware of being watched. It turned out to be the shepherd belonging to the unfortunate captured sheep. An agreement was struck and the shepherd went off quite happy with the head, feet and fleece!

Douglas witnessed the carnage of human life, in both military and civilians and he himself had been injured in action. He was invalided out of the raiding unit in 1944 and became a dispatch rider in 1945.

He met and married **Jessie Cameron** in **Priestland** in 1945. After the war he returned to **Darvel** and worked in a quarry before settling down to a well earned retirement.



Lt Col **John James (Jack) Nixon** (1924-2002)

Jack Nixon aged 19 on his wedding day

Jack Nixon Born in Newcastle had moved to the borders when he was five years old. Lying about his age, he joined the Kings Own Scottish Borderers at the age of 15 when war broke out. He volunteered for special service in No.7 Commando Group, based in Girvan.

Having served in various raids in North Africa, he became one of the founder commandos serving under David Stirling and Paddy Mayne. By 1944 he was moved to Mauchline then Darvel for more intensive training.

Jack Nixen had a habit of keeping his finger on the trigger of a Bren gun for too long and Paddy Mayne constantly shouted at him that it should only be two bursts in quick succession. Jack was known to have said under his breath, "That man is the bane of my life." Nixon's skill with the Bren was well known and his prowess would be heavily tested throughout the coming months. Douglas Monteith stated "Jack was incredible with that thing and I was just glad that he was on our side and not shooting at us." [1]

Jack Nixon married **Molly Auld** from **Priestland** in 1944 and remained in Darvel after the war. He was demobbed in 1946 and on returning to civilian life, worked as a farm labourer at Heads Farm, Newmilns then became the Co-op coalman in Darvel before joining Spray & Burgess, a lace finishing firm.

He moved several times before settling back in **Darvel** for his retirement.



Rev. **James Fraser McLuskey**. (1914-2005)

Chaplain to the 1st SAS, he was also based for some time in **Darvel**. He was chaplain to Edinburgh University when he decided to join the parachute regiment. It was the same rigorous training as everyone else and once he got his wings, it was suggested that he should join the SAS.

He almost missed the opportunity of training for a parachute regiment. McLuskey wore false teeth and anyone with false teeth wasn't allowed to train for parachute jumps. Fortunately rules had changed and at the start of the war, the army provided boxes for false teeth thus allowing the men to take part.

Writer of several books, he was one of the early to record their army exploits in his book, 'The Parachuting Padre' which was released in 1951 and wary of security of saying too much, Fraser changed the names of places frequently to preserve his own security as much as the army's.

He was a tall, jovial character, well suited for a chaplain's life in the army. He travelled everywhere, armed only with a Bible, altar cloth and wooden cross, and often with Malcolm James Pleydell, first medical officer and supported the injured and their families as well as holding services in the field, he never wavered in his duty to the men. He was awarded a Military Cross in recognition of his services.

It was good fortune that the padre was a Scot and the HQ was in Ayrshire. Whilst training at Chesterfield, there were others from different religious backgrounds. He said "that while one denomination or another might be held most efficacious for man's upward ascent, Church and Chapel, Protestant or Roman, bow all alike to gravity and fall with equal force".

Rev. McLuskey conducted **Paddy Mayne's** funeral service.

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RED ADMIRALS...

It was a forlorn little thing — a forgotten plant tucked behind an old shed, leaning against a fence that needed fixing. Barely two feet tall, it looked destined to wither away unnoticed. No one would have cared if it did. No one human, at least.

I rarely have cause to wander into that corner of the garden, but one warm, humid afternoon in mid-August 2025, I did — and stopped dead in my tracks. The scruffy buddleia was alive. Covered. Seething. Cloaked in a happy hug. A kaleidoscope of Red Admirals jostled for space on its nectar-rich flowers. I couldn't count them — though I was tempted to order them to line up — but there were easily hundreds, each trying to stake the best feeding spot.

They formed a living tapestry, a restless carpet of wings, their velvety black broken by vivid orange-red bands and edged in flickers of blue and white. Despite their delicate appearance, these bold little creatures were fearless, settling on my hands and arms as I stood, transfixed by their hypnotic dance.

And here it was — in my own garden in Darvel, at 56° north, the same latitude as Juneau, Alaska, and Kaliningrad, Russia — a riot of colour and joy miraculously carried here on a soft summer breeze from southern Europe.

That was yesterday. Today the last of my new friends sits alone. Tomorrow, a new southerly wind will bring hope for next year.

A BLACKBIRD'S STORY...



It was one of those balmy days that we enjoyed during May earlier this year. The temperature on the garden thermometer had just touched 24C. I happened to notice a blackbird flying into my greenhouse which was sitting with the door open. This was nothing unusual since garden birds do venture into the greenhouse but inevitably find their way back out through the door, so I thought no more about it.

Several days later while checking the various sprays located on the middle shelf of the shelving unit in the greenhouse, lo and behold hidden there was a newly built nest, with four pale blue blackbird eggs. I would normally have closed over the greenhouse door at various times during the month but now felt obliged to leave it open to allow the blackbird parents access to the nest and its contents. A few weeks later the eggs had hatched and four fledging blackbirds with beaks open, craving food now occupied the nest.

The chicks then, when they were able, left the nest. Perhaps they were only waiting for this moment to arrive. Before I could determine what my next step would be, the departed chicks were almost immediately replaced by a further four pale blue eggs. This blackbird pair certainly had found a safe, dry and warm to build their nest. So, the greenhouse door remained open, and my plan was to then close the greenhouse door once this brood had flown the nest. But you underestimate these smart blackbirds at your peril.

No sooner has the chicks ventured into the wide world, another three pale blue eggs were laid – photo 1 and nurtured by the parents – photo 2. The chicks duly emerged from their shells a couple of weeks later and the feeding frenzy again took place – photo 3. A further two weeks and this third brood flew off into the sunset. I understand that blackbirds very rarely exceed three egg laying episodes, so the greenhouse door could eventually be closed.

So, the question for me will now be....do I leave the greenhouse door open next May to enable the blackbirds to return and build a new nest and keep the blackbird's story alive??

Darvel Diaspora

Back in December 2019 — just months before the world shut down in the grip of a pandemic — we asked our community a simple question:

Where are your friends and family with close ties to Darvel living now?

The response was fantastic, and we've repeated the exercise every year since. As Christmas approaches, it's become a warm tradition — a way to think of far-flung friends while the town glows with festive lights.

Over the years, the list has grown to 334 locations across every inhabited continent.

- Australia leads the way, with Perth (11 mentions) far ahead, followed by Melbourne, Sydney, Brisbane, and smaller towns like Nathalia, Cairns, Ballarat, and Mundijong.
- Canada takes a strong second, with Toronto, Calgary, Montreal, Vancouver, Edmonton, and Nanaimo among the destinations.
- Asia is well represented: Hong Kong (4), Singapore (3), Tokyo, Busan, Colombo, and Wuxi.
- Europe is a colourful scatter — Spain (Segovia, Madrid, Majorca, Barcelona, Bilbao, Nerja), France (Paris, Deauville, Villemomble, Mandelieu-La Napoule, Caen), and Nordic nations like Sweden and Norway.
- North America beyond Canada includes California, Texas, New York, Boston, Florida, Colorado, and Nevada.
- More far-flung connections stretch to South America (Medellín, Buenos Aires, Lima, Ushuaia), Africa (Cape Town, Johannesburg, Malawi), and Oceania (New Zealand, Cook Islands).

Some in today's Darvel diaspora are first-generation adventurers — moving for work, study, or love. Others are the children and grandchildren of earlier emigrants. Many maintain strong ties, coming back for visits or keeping up through family, social media, and community events.

When the Sir Alexander Fleming mural was unveiled in April 2025, messages poured in from around the world — proof that no matter how far they roam, Darvel folk keep one eye on home.

The map of the Darvel diaspora mirrors Scotland's wider story: a web of connections stretching across the globe, shaped by opportunity, change, and the enduring pull of a small town. Wherever they land — from Perth to Toronto, Hong Kong to Cape Town — Darvel people carry the same blend of Irvine Valley grit, humour, and warmth, leaving their mark on communities far from the Ayrshire hills.

How Times Have Changed

Several years ago Hendy Pollok on FaceBook posted a list of the shops and businesses on West and East Main Street in the early 1960's that he could remember from his younger days in Darvel. How times have changed when we now have only a handful of shops and businesses along Main St.

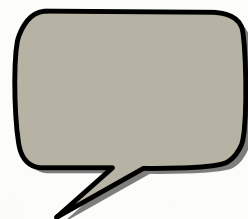

Hendy's post attracted a large number of comments, many sharing their own memories of the shops and businesses with a few identifying other shops that were not on Hendy's list ...and not just on Main Street.

Here are a few of the comments...



I Remember many of those, particularly Wilsons Butcher and Patterson fruit and veg. As a young child my Mum sent me on my own to get her messages. When I returned to the butchers many years later with my own 4 year old daughter, he looked at her and said "that wee lassie reminds me of a wee girl that used to come in here many years ago to get her Mammies meat. His surprise was great when I said that was me!

Julyan's the bakers at the corner of Burn Rd, Ranoldcoup Rd the drapery, opposite there was a painter decorators, also 2 joiners, one going up Jamieson Rd and another on east Donnington St. McCalls, Smith garage (transport) West Donnington St, also Co-op in Patterson terrace and Allan's electrical shop next to the Smithy.

Lockie Cox the bookie at the top o the fitba club brae.

There was a wee shop that sold paint and wallpaper on the corner down from Papini's.

The Town foot store next to Barclay's before "self service" store was opened. The "old store" was used as a "bookies" office for a short time after self service was opened. Auld Wull Connell and his son "Nell" used to lift the lines for Lochie Cox from there. I think you also could get newspapers from there at one stage. There was also a hairdresser's just down from Barclay's, which at one stage was a shop where you could buy pork, bacon, pigs trotters etc. Some of the "older" generation might remember Alex Smith having his "painters and decorators" shop across from the drapery.

Bob Taylor the bakers between Town Hall and Black Bull.

King painters and decorators at top of Irvinebank Road?

I used to get sent to Gemmell's for shredded gammon for the lunch rolls. Lots of good memories there.

Remember walking to Papini's for ices creams in the summer.

Royal Bank of Scotland next to guide hall, TSB between Walker & Connell and chemist Coop store up Paterson terrace; Drapery on Ranoldcoup Road

I remember that Julyans the bakers sold the best tablet me and my pal used to get thrupence worth then give a bit to Snowy the Elliot's Alsatian so we could take a short cut through the bakers.

Used to be a photographers next to what was Allan's the butchers, it's a house now but that was Leslie's shoe shop long before Grant's Photographers.

Don't forget the Garden Café, West Donnington Street.

Moved to Darvel July 1980 and remember a lot of these shops. My 2 favourites were the red shop and the green shop (Milroys & McLeans) next door to each other on East Main St. Spent all my pocket money on comics and sweeties.

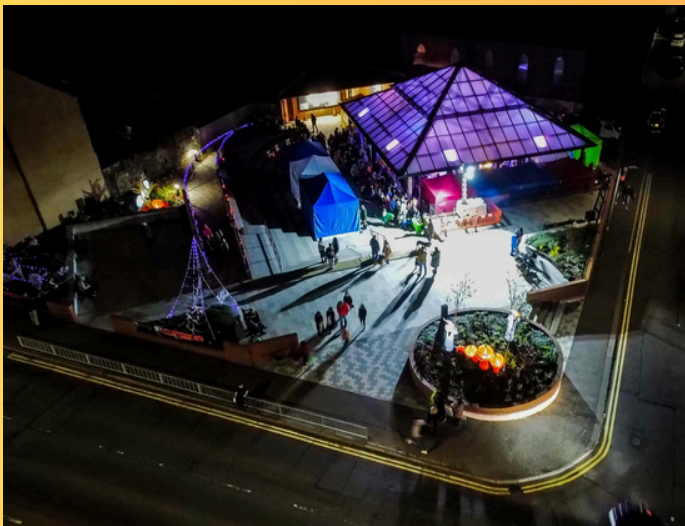

Darvel FC Community Links

Darvel football club will be focussed on increasing the ties between the club and the local community. The aim is to expand the existing club facilities at Recreation Park.
